



- You are Cloud Computing if....
 - You use Gmail, AOL, Hotmail, Yahoo, etc
 - You get movies from Netflix Instant Streaming
 - You read the Newspaper Online
 - You share your Photos on Picasa, Flixster, Snapfish
 - You are on Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn
 - You make an appointment with the Apple Store online
 - You look for restaurants while traveling with Urban Spoon
 - You check Trip Advisor before booking a hotel
 - You do your banking online

Some Examples of the Cloud

- Amazon Kindle stores your books in their cloud
- Amazon Prime Instant Video stores movies and tv shows you purchase from them
- Apple iCloud stores your pictures, music, calendars, notes, etc.
- Netflix stores your Queue until you are ready for it
- Picasa stores your photo albums and the albums of your friends and family

- What is the Alternative?
 - Store your information on your computer or laptop, or external hard drive
 - Store your information on CD's or DVD's
 - Store your pictures in a shoebox in the garage
 - Store your receipts in a file in the office
 - Store your receipts in your purse

Precautions to Keep Your Data Safe

- The right password
 - More than eight characters
 - Letters, numbers, symbols
 - Uppercase, lowercase
 - Don't use the same password all the time
 - Store your passwords in a secure place to assist you in remembering them (example: create a Word document with your passwords and password protect the document)
- Be wary
 - Do not give out information over the phone
 - Shred anything with your vital information

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
